Seven Ways to Celebrate Advent (Without Entering a Store)

Christmas in the media has become so much about buying things - how do we teach our children that it's really about the coming of Jesus , the Son of God, into our humble and broken world? How do we teach our children gratefulness for this greatest gift, when the world is telling them that it is the latest gadget that will fill up that God-sized hole in their heart? Here are a few ideas that can help to orient your children to the true meaning of Advent and Christmas:

- Make some cocoa, and sit down to watch a classic Christmas movie with your family. My personal favorite is It's A Wonderful Life, but there are a whole lot of wonderful movies out there. Check out The Nativity Story, A Charlie Brown Christmas, VeggieTales: Saint Nicholas, Christmas Oranges, and The Ultimate Gift.
- 2. A classic to help children learn about the joy of waiting that's part of Advent: cut out 25 strips of red and green construction paper, staple them into loops in a chain, and hang in a prominent place. Every day your child can remove a loop, bringing them one day closer to Christmas. If you really want to help your child prepare their heart for the coming of Christ, make it a rule that they have to do a kind deed before they can remove that day's loop.



- 3. Ask your child to act out the story of Christmas with your family's nativity set. Younger children may need a little help, while older children simply want you to be their audience. If they improvise a little on the story, that's OK it's so wonderful to see how they interpret the story of our Lord's birth.
- 4. On a clear night, go for a short walk and debate which star most resembles the Star of Bethlehem. Talk about how shocked the shepherds must have been to look up into the night sky and see angels announcing the birth of Christ!

Are you looking for a way to make Advent and Christmas less about presents and more about preparing for Jesus? How about an Advent wreath? Children love to see the light from the candles increase through the four weeks of Advent as an expression of the growing anticipation of the birth of Jesus Christ, the light of the world. The circular wreath represents God's eternity as it has no end. Evergreen beginning or wreaths (evergreens are a symbol of everlasting life) are the most traditional, but there are many different kinds of Advent wreaths, from simple to elaborate. (You can find Advent wreaths locally at St. Patrick's Guild, Leaflet Missal, and online.) The Advent wreath that fits your family is the perfect one!

Then you'll need candles. Traditionally, three candles are purple and one is rose. The purple candles symbolize prayer, penance and good works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over and they are close to Christmas. Some wreaths have a larger, central fifth candle (generally white), which is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day to signify Christ's birth.

In our family we've always placed our Advent wreath on the dinner table, lit the candles, and prayed before we eat, but other families

gather around the Advent wreath at bedtime to light their candles and take a few moments out of their busy days to center themselves on Christ. You can sing a song such as "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" " or pray a special prayer such as the following:

A Family Advent Prayer

May the light of these candles be a sign that Christ is the center of our family and the warmth of our love. We pray that the fire of our love for Christ and for each other will grow, burning brightly in the winter darkness. We ask this through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

- 5. As a family, participate in the Sacrament of Reconciliation to prepare your hearts for Christ's coming. Talk with your children about how God always forgives us when we go to confession, and in his mercy even sent his Son to redeem us. We have Reconciliation in our parish every Saturday from 3 3:45 pm, as well special Advent times of Dec. 13 from 6:30 8 pm, Dec. 21 from 6:30 8 pm, and Dec. 22 from 1—2:30 pm.
- 6. When you wrap presents, ask your child to help you (yes, they may not be as perfectly wrapped, but your child will feel that they're a part of the giving, not just the receiving). As you wrap each present, say a prayer for the person who will receive the gift.
- 7. Sing. Sing Christmas songs, both secular and sacred. Children nowadays listen to music 24/7 on their iPods, but they so seldom experience the joy of making the music themselves! Let them experience that joy that comes with singing not to impress other people, but because God created



us to raise our voices joyfully in song. When that favorite song comes on the radio while you're getting ready for dinner, dance around the kitchen and belt out the lyrics together, no matter how off-key you are. Maybe even go caroling around your block - your older neighbors will be delighted!

Classroom Update

CGS Level I (Preschool/Kindergarten)

Lead Catechist: Sally Strasser

Asst. Catechists: Deb Tillges & Rachel Villneauve In the Level 1 atrium for CGS we have been very busy. We participated in the rosary and after reciting those prayers, we went back to our class and talked more about the different types of prayer. We are working on the Hail Mary and the Sign of the Cross. We have been working on pouring water from one vessel to the next, and on gestures that are done during mass. We have started talking about the maps and the geography of Israel and the City that Jesus was born to prepare them for the start of Advent and the Infancy narratives. We will start this with changing the color on our prayer table and setting up an Advent wreath. We continue to get to know one another more each week.

CGS Level II (Grades 1 - 3) Lead Catechist: Jill Kleidon

In the last few weeks in CGS the children have learned about the articles of the Mass and the vestments of the priest. We practiced matching the picture of the item to the word. They also learned what the item is for, like the lavabo, the bowl Father washes his hands in, and the ciborium, the vessel we keep the consecrated host: Jesus, who is kept in the tabernacle. Joanie and Kathy worked with the children on the significance of the Our Father. Your children had some great insights to add to the discussion. Last week the children worked on learning about Israel. They learned about the waterways, mountains and cities that were significant as Jesus traveled through them during his ministry.

Grade 4

In our last three sessions we've been learning about how the Holy Spirit guides the Church, how our pope and bishops are in line from St. Peter and the apostles, how God has made us to be with Him in heaven, and about God's mercy in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Grade 5

Catechist: Joe Wappes

These last few weeks, we have been learning about Creation. Through the two Creation accounts in the Bible, that God created us because he loves us and wants us to live in heaven with him. Also, we know that all humans are good because they are created in the image and likeness or God, and can think and choose as God does.

Grade 6

Catechists Cathy Shannon and Carrie Stout The 6th grade students are continuing their exploration of the nature of God. They learned about the Holy Trinity, with Father, Son, and Holy Spirit all a part of one God. The students learned an equation for the Holy Trinity to explain how they are related: 1+1+1=1. The class learned some verses from the Hebrew prayer, the Shema, which states that there is only one God. Last week the students learned about Creation and read the first chapter of Genesis. They learned that we were created by God, in His image, and that He loves us. God wants us to be with Him but has given us the gift of Free Will so that we have the choice to take actions which bring us closer to Him or away from Him. Class 4: Proofs for the existence of God from science and reason. Nothing comes from nothing. The leap of faith.


Class 5: Who was Jesus, a Liar, Lunatic or the Lord? Why did He come?
